- ◆ Creative thinkers who can view situations/problems from multiple perspectives, collect and analyze data and construct, implement and evaluate action
- ◆ Excellent teachers who are committed to and able to promote powerful learning for all students with a special focus on those students who—heretofore—have been underserved by schools
- ◆ Strategic agents in the ongoing change process in schools
- ◆ Self-directed learners who can and do own their professional growth and learning
- ◆ Disciplined managers of self, time and environment

- ◆ Classes offered at Pacific Lutheran University
