

Talk with your family & support network

Ask family members, teachers, and people close to your age about their college experience. Share your own interests and goals to get advice, and be sure to **connect** with experts like college and school counselors.

Make a wish list

Begin listing all the things you want in a college. Think size, location, and environment. List everything from possible majors to extracurricular activities to food! Then pick 10 colleges you know about and compare what they have to your wish list. Not sure what you want? Visit different colleges in your area even if you're not considering them - what you like and don't like about that visit can help get you started on your list!

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Take challenging classes

Taking rigorous classes like Honors, AP and IB will help prepare you for college coursework and help your college application stand out. Your junior year grades will be especially important, as will your senior year course selection.

Find out about financial aid

How to pay for college is probably the most intimidating part of the process, but the more informed you are, the less stressful this part will be! Go to info sessions, watch webinars and videos (including PLU's!), and read articles. Then you'll know what questions to ask colleges, like 'what's your average cost after financial aid?', 'does your average financial aid award include loans?' or 'does your school give out mostly needbased scholarships?'

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Search for scholarships

A great question to ask colleges is which of their scholarships you might qualify for based on your grades, involvement (like music or athletics), identity, location, financial need, etc. Additionally, don't forget to look for 'outside' scholarships scholarships from your own high school, local community, state, and even nationwide scholarships.

Research online

Utilize college search sites to find a good match. Browse college websites to get information about their programs and student life. Check out virtual tours and social media accounts for a closer look. Don't ignore college emails and mail - you may find one you haven't heard of that could be a good fit!

Get involved & write it down

Get involved in activities that you're passionate about (not just because you were told they'd look good on an application), and keep track of everything you do, including jobs and community service (don't sell yourself short!). You'll be ahead of the game when it comes time to start your college applications

You can get in!

Of the nearly 4,000 colleges and universities in the U.S., fewer than 100 are highly selective, which means they accept less than 25% of applicants. There are so many colleges that can fit any student, so know that there is a place for you.
