 *Tip: Encourage your student to visit—even if they don't know what to ask. In a national study, students who used career services were 15% more likely to have a job offer before graduation.*

Myths vs. Reality

Myth	Reality
"Major = career"	Skills and experience matter more—majors are flexible.
"Freshmen can't get internships"	Many first-year students find part-time jobs, shadowing, or summer roles.
"Only GPA matters to employers"	Fewer than 50% of employers filter by GPA. They want skills + experience.
"It's too early to visit Career Center"	The earlier the better—even to explore options.

Questions You Can Ask Your Student

You don't need all the answers—just be curious and supportive.

Try:

“What’s something new you’ve learned about yourself or what you might want to do?”

“Which clubs, events, or jobs on campus are you curious about?”






“What have you been thinking about for summer plans?”

“What support services have you tried on campus?”

First-Year Starting Points





It's not too early to take first steps!

Encourage your student to:

-  Take a career assessment (PathwayU)
-  Attend one career event or workshop
-  Join a club or volunteer
-  Explore Handshake for part-time jobs or internships
-  Meet a career coach—even if unsure

Support Without Pressure

You're already helping just by being involved! Try to:

-  Ask open-ended questions
-  Encourage small steps, not perfection
-  Normalize changing their mind- it's part of the process!
-  Remind them to ask for help—it's a strength
