Launch with Confidence & Purpose

S CONNECT
 Attend networking dinners, internship encounters, or career fairs—opportunities now often lead to jobs later. Many opportunities are posted on Handshake! Schedule informational interviews with professionals in your desired field to learn about roles, companies, and next steps. Even if you've done these every year, it's a great practice to keep growing even AFTER college! Stay in touch with mentors and faculty—they may be valuable advisors long after graduation.

MENGAGE YOUR LAUNCH

Apply for jobs, service programs, or graduate school —many applications start 3–6 months before your desired start date.
Secure 2–3 people to serve as references who can speak to your strengths, growth, and character. Be sure to ask 1-2 months in advance for letters of recommendation.
Polish your resume, cover letters, portfolio, and LinkedIn profile —each should reflect your skills and direction.
☐ Have a template resume where you keep ALL of your experiences, that you can return to to customize for each opportunity you pursue.
Practice interviewing and salary negotiation with a coach through <u>Career Services</u> or <u>TimelyCare</u>
Track your applications, interviews, and offers in one place—organization reduces stress.
Attend a final resume or job search workshop for last-minute feedback and tips.

Your first step after graduation <u>doesn't define your whole career</u>. What matters most is **aligning** your decisions with your purpose, strengths, and values.
