Spring Introduction ("Gateway") Courses

PHIL 248: *Innovation, Ethics, and Society* (Michael Schleeter): M, W, 3:40pm-5:25pm--One of the introduction or "gateway" courses into the INOV program and a PH credit. (Emphasizes the ethical issues associated with innovation initiatives.)

HIST 121: *History in Video Games* (Michael Halvorson): M, W, F, 12:30-1:35pm--A second "gateway" or elective course in the minor, which carries an AR credit. (Teaches innovation concepts through video game history and design.)

HIST 247: *U.S. Capitalism: From Railroads to Netflix* (Rebekah Mergenthal): Tues, Thurs, 11:50am-1:35pm--An elective course in the minor that teaches innovation in the context of the U.S. economy, emphasizing capitalist principles, businesses, consumers, and products. Approved as a Gateway or Principles course with permission of program chair. (Carries SO credit.)

Spring Principles Courses (two required)

BUSA 201: Introduction to Business in the Global Environment (Kory Brown): M, W, F, 11:15am-12:20pm-Introduces value-generating innovation and explores ethical, cultural, operational, and legal issues in both smaller entrepreneurial organizations and larger global entities. (Counts as a "Principles" course.)

ECON 101: *Principles of Microeconomics* (Cameron Raber): M, W, F at 9:15am or M, W, Fri at 12:30pm. Introduces the study of economic decision making by firms and individuals and analyzes the effect of public policies. (Counts as a "Principles" course.)

ARTD 110: *Graphic Design* (Staff): Tues, Thurs, 9:55am-11:40am. An introduction to design concepts through the study of basic techniques, color theory, and composition. (Counts as a "Principles" course.)

COMA 215: Writing in Communication Careers (Sean Robinson): M, W, F, 12:30pm-1:35pm. Introduces students to the fundamental standards and expectations in communication writing. (Counts as a "Principles" course.)

Concluding Seminar (taught each Spring)

INOV 350: *Innovation Seminar* (Kory Brown): M, W, 1:45pm-3:30pm--The concluding seminar in the minor which emphasizes hands-on innovation concepts and projects. (Required for INOV minor.)
