F: Faculty members must submit objections to proposals in writing to the Chair of EPC via <u>facgov@plu.edu</u> within 30 days from the date listed on the 30-day Notice of Curriculum Changes distributed by the EPC. Objections received within this 30-day period will suspend approval, pending resolution of the objections. In the event a dispute cannot be resolved, the EPC will make its recommendation to the faculty for action at the next regular faculty meeting.

GEOSCIENCES

Bachelor of Arts Degree

Major in Geosciences

34 semester hours in following geosciences courses, plus 4 semester hours in supporting courses

The bachelor of arts degree is the minimum preparation for the field and is best combined with other degree programs, such as another major or minor. Students interested in Earth Science and completing a bachelor of arts in education often combine it with this degree.

Courses

GEOS 334: Hydrogeology

Study of the hydrologic cycle, investigating surface and groundwater flow, resource evaluation and development, wells, water quality and geothermal resources. Emphasis on water problems in the Puget Sound area, with additional examples from diverse geologic environments. Includes labs. Prerequisite: GEOS 201 or consent of instructor. (4)

GEOS 335: Geophysics

Study of the physical nature of the earth, its properties and processes, employing techniques from seismology, heat flow, gravity, magnetism, and electrical conductivity. Emphasis on understanding the earth's formation, structure, and plate tectonics processes as well as geophysical exploration techniques. Includes labs. Prerequisites: GEOS 201, one semester of calculus, physics (high-school-level or above), or consent of instructor. (4)

GEOS 340: Glacial Geology

Applied and theoretical study of glacier dynamics, glacial geomorphology, and ice ages. Includes the role of glaciers in water resources, earth history, and climate change. Examines ice on microscopic to continental scales. Examines glacial change on short- and long-term timescales. Local glaciated environments will be featured. Includes labs. Prerequisite: GEOS 201 or consent of instructor. (4)

GEOS 350: Marine Geology

Study of the 70% of the earth beneath the oceans, focusing on the extensive discoveries of the past few decades. Emphasis on marine sediments, sedimentary processes, plate tectonic processes, and the historical geology of the oceans. Includes labs. Prerequisite: GEOS 102 or 201, or consent of instructor. (4)

- 12 semester hours of electives from MATH/STAT 342, MATH/STAT 348, either MATH 351 or PHYS 354, MATH 356, either MATH 433 or MATH 455, CSCI 330, CSCI 367, CSCI 371, CHEM 341, ECON 344, PHYS 356. At least 8 semester hours of these must be taken from mathematics or statistics.

A maximum of eight (8) credits at the 300+ level may be double-counted for other major requirements, and a maximum of eight (8) credits may be doublecounted for other minor requirements. (Petitions to substitute courses may be submitted to the department chair to address double-counting constraints.) Students minoring in statistics may not use any of their "8 additional semester hours of statistics" toward the Applied Mathematics major.

MATH 422: Mathematical Modeling

This course introduces students to mathematical modeling of various problems in biology, environmental science and physics using curve fitting, difference and differential equations, simulations, discrete probabilistic models, and other methods. In addition to mathematical techniques, the formulation and analysis of models, and the interpretation of mathematical results in context are also emphasized. Students will have a chance to work on a project of their choosing and to build writing skills. Prerequisites: Math 245 or Math 253, and one of Math 331, Math 351 or PHYS 354.

Courses

PSYC 315 : Abnormal Psychology Clinical Psychology 1: Mental Health and Psychological Disorders

Models of psychopathology. Diagnosis and treatment of abnormal behaviors. This course provides an overview of systems of classifying and diagnosing psychological symptoms and biopsychosocial/developmental models for understanding and treating mental disorders (Previously termed Abnormal Psychology). Prereq: PSYC 101 (4)

PSYC 435 : Theories and Methods of Counseling and Psychotherapy Clinical Psychology 2: Psychotherapy

Introduction to basic methods of counseling and psychotherapy, and examination of the theories from which these methods derive. Prerequisites: PSYC 310 or 315; or consent of instructor. (4)

PSYC 442 : Learning: Research and Theory Memory

A critical overview of the **science** of research data on human and animal learning, and **memory** of the theoretical attempts to understand those data. Prerequisite: STAT 232. (4)

Dance (DANC) - Undergraduate Courses

DANC 170 : Introduction to Dance - AR

An introduction to Western concert dance forms; including, ballet, modern/contemporary, and jazz. The course combines discussion and movement practice. (4)

DANC 222 : Beginning/Intermediate Jazz-Musical Theatre Dance - AR, PE

Students practice **musical theatre and** jazz dance technique, **musical theatre and** jazz choreography, and learn the history of **musical theatre and** jazz dance. Designed for students who have never taken a **musical theatre or** jazz dance class before, as well as for more experienced dancers. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. <u>May not be repeated for PE credit</u>. **Fulfills one course towards the PE GenEd Element.** Cross-listed with PHED 222. (1) (2)

DANC 251 : Beginning/Intermediate Ballet - AR, PE

Students practice ballet technique, ballet choreography, and learn the history of ballet. Designed for students who have never taken a ballet class before, as well as for more experienced dancers. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. May not be repeated for PE credit. Fulfills one course towards the PE GenEd Element. (1) (2)

DANC 252 : Beginning/Intermediate Contemporary - AR, PE

Students practice contemporary dance technique, contemporary choreography, and learn the history of contemporary and modern dance. Designed for students who have never taken a contemporary dance class before, as well as for more experienced dancers. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. May not be repeated for PE credit. Fulfills one course towards the PE GenEd Element. (1) (2)

DANC 254 : Beginning/Intermediate Tap - AR, PE

Students practice tap dance technique, tap choreography, and learn the history of tap dance. Designed for students who have never taken a tap dance class before, as well as for more experienced dancers. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. May not be repeated for PE credit. Fulfills one course towards the PE GenEd Element. (1) (2)

DANC 255 : Beginning/Intermediate Hip Hop - AR, PE

Students practice hip hop dance technique, hip hop choreography, and learn the history of hip hop. Designed for students who have never taken a hip hop dance class before, as well as more experienced dancers. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. May not be repeated for PE credit. Fulfills one course towards the PE GenEd Element. (1) (2)

DANC 301 : Dance and Culture - C

A cross-cultural **An** examination of **the history and culture of** dance forms and **choreographic methods** from around the world in their historical, artistic, and socio-cultural contexts. Students will learn to contextualize a variety of global dance traditions while examining their personal worldview. This course is primarily a **A** seminar-based class, but **that** includes a significant amount of physical movement. (4)

DANC 310 : Functional Alignment

Students deepen the understanding of their physical alignment through experiential anatomy and improvisational exercises. (1)

DANC 322 : Advanced Jazz-Musical Theatre Dance

Designed for intermediate/advanced students, this course further develops **musical theatre and** jazz dance technique and performance. Repeatable for credit up to 4 times. Prerequisite: consent of instructor or DANC 222. (1) (2)

Theatre (THEA) - Undergraduate Courses

THEA 160 : Introduction to Theatre - AR A survey of the general nature of dramatic presentation; including elements of dramatic structure, types of drama, and the contributions of the actor, director, designer, technician, and audience. (4) An exploration of live theatre and its many elements, including the contributions of its writers, directors, performers, designers, technicians and audiences. (4)

THEA 200 : Theatre Rehearsal and Performance Students perform in a specific faculty-directed production. Repeatable for a maximum of 12 semester hours. (0-4)

THEA 215 : Voice and Movement - AR Exploration of the actor's voice and body as vital tools for dramatic expression. (4)

THEA 225 : Running Crew I

A practicum course, students work backstage or in production shops on a facultydirected production to learn about and execute beginning and intermediate-level running crew assignments. Repeatable for a maximum of 8 semester hours. (1-8)

THEA 255 : Theatrical Production - AR Basic theory and procedure of all backstage elements in the theatre, costumes, scenery, props, lights, and makeup. (4)

An introduction to the backstage elements of theatre, including costumes, scenery, props, lighting, and makeup. (4)

THEA 260 : Stagecraft

A combination of lecture and hands on experience in the execution of scenic designs for the stage including safety procedures, construction techniques and materials, theatrical rigging, welding, and organizational planning of theatrical production. Prerequisite: THEA 255. (2)

THEA 275 : Scenic Painting: Techniques

Color theory and techniques used for painting scenery in theatrical applications. (2)

Color theory and hands-on painting techniques for theatrical productions. (2)

Color theory and techniques used for painting scenery in theatrical applications. (2)

Painting techniques and texture painting for theatrical productions. (2)

THEA 290 : Stage Management The study and practice of stage management with an emphasis on functions of the stage manager in the theatrical production process. (2)

The study and practice of stage management and its vital role in the theatrical production process. (2)

THEA 330 : Script Analysis

Discussion of the major theories of drama and apply those literary and dramatic elements of plays and the analysis of selected drama from a variety of historical periods. (4)

Discussion of the ideas, forms, structures and elements of contemporary plays and musicals. (4)

THEA 345 : Playwriting Techniques for writing one-act **short** plays and **an** analysis of dramatic structure and elements. (4)

THEA 346 : The Audition

Techniques for choosing and preparing effective monologues, cold and prepared readings, head shots and résumés, and interview skills. (2)

Techniques for choosing and preparing effective audition material, cold and prepared readings, and head shots and résumés for stage, television, and film. (2) THEA 347 : The Vocal Audition

Techniques for choosing and preparing effective audition songs, cuttings, and interview skills related to musical theatre. (2)

Techniques for choosing and preparing effective audition songs and cuttings for musical theatre. (2)

THEA 350 : Acting II Scene Study

An intermediate course in which students gain practical experience through performance of monologues and scenes from modern and contemporary theatre. Prerequisite: THEA 250 or consent of instructor. (4) Analyzing and performing scenes and monologues to deepen performances and prepare audition material. Prerequisites: THEA 250 or consent of instructor. (4)

THEA 355 : Lighting Design

An examination of the controllable properties of light and their application to the functions of theatrical lighting. Students will express ideas through research, critical analysis, presentation, and practical lab exercises. Prerequisite: THEA 254. (4)

A practical application of electrical, programming, and artistic skills needed for theatrical lighting design. Prerequisite: THEA 254. (4)

THEA 360 : Theatre History: Origins - AR

A survey of the history of theatre and an examination of theatre as an institution that reflects historical moments and participates in the forming of social values and ideas. (4)

A survey of theatre's origins as an institution that reflects history while forming new social values and ideas. (4)

THEA 362 : Musical Theatre History - AR

A survey of the history of musical theatre and an examination of musical theatre as an institution that reflects historical moments and participates in the forming of social values and ideas. (4)

A survey of Broadway musical theatre as an institution that reflects history while forming new social values and ideas. (4)

THEA 365 : Theatre History: Modernism II - AR

This course surveys the history of theatre from the end of the 18th century through the present day. Students will examine theatre as an institution that both reflects historical moments and participates in the forming of social values and ideas. (4)

A survey of theatre in modern and contemporary times as an institution that reflects history while forming new social values and ideas. (4)

THEA 400 : Theatre Rehearsal and Performance Students perform in a faculty-directed production. Repeatable for a maximum of 12 semester hours. (0-4)

THEA 425 : Running Crew II

A practicum course, students work backstage or in production shops on a facultydirected production to learn about and execute intermediate and advanced-level running crew assignments. Repeatable for a maximum of 8 semester hours. (1-8) A practicum course, students work on intermediate and advanced-level running crew assignments or in production shops on a faculty-directed production. Repeatable for a maximum of 8 semester hours. (1-8)

THEA 450 : Acting III Styles

Analyzing and performing differing styles of acting representing various time periods and genres. Prerequisites: THEA 250 or consent of instructor. (4)
