1. Best Practices

- What standards and ethics are being used?
- Is the author directly tied to the story?
- Does the outlet check for accuracy and ensure diversity?

2. References

- Are the sources that the writer used acknowledged in the article?
- Can you find where the writer obtained the information?
- Is there additional information that can help back up the first source information?

3. Diversity

- Does the news outlet have a diverse perspective?
- Are both sides of the party interviewed?

4. Labels

- This type of information helps determine if the prompt is written out of bias.
- Is the purpose of why it was created clear to the audience?
- Is the work labeled clearly to distinguish between opinion, analysis or news?

5. Expertise

- What is their field of expertise?
 - Have they written any other articles?
 - Is the author credible?
- Example: The writers for real news will have a biography and you are able to track them to see if they are real or not.

6. Local

- Was the reporting done at the location/scene or just talked about?
- Real News contains a timestamp with the location.
- Do the reporters know the community?

7. Methods

- What was the process used to collect information.
- What is the motivation behind the story?
- What is the timeframe given to complete the work?
- Was anyone else involved in the process?

8. Actionable Feedback

- Are people held accountable for ensuring accuracy?
- Does the news outlet follow a Code of Ethics or Standards?

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
