The U.S. was attacked, the country marches to war, everyone's on high alert, and 110,000 people of Japanese ancestry have been rounded up and imprisoned under Executive Order 9066. Over the past 30 years, PLU's Elliott Press has offered students the opportunity to learn the history of the printed book. Through classes in letterpress printing, typography and bookbinding, they gain a deep understanding using a handson approach. Thanks to a massive donation from West Coast Paper earlier this year, the Thorniley Collection of Antique Type has joined the Elliott Press, offering both students and the community the chance to see functioning printing presses, bookbinding tools, as well as wood and

metal type from the 19th Century. Highlights include a Washington Hand Press, the first iron hand press manufactured in the U.S., as well as a Union Pearl, the oldest decorative typeface, first cast in 1690.

Join us to take a look at a working museum of the largest collection of type and presses in the Pacific Northwest. We will see examples of student work, and print a keepsake to take home, created on an antique printing press.

Jessica Spring is Resident Artist in Art and Design at PLU, as well as the Elliott Press Manager. She teaches the Art of the Book classes, plus courses in typography and graphic design.

Jessica designs, prints, and binds artists' books featuring handmade paper and letterpress printing. Her own small, finely crafted editions, produced at Springtide Press, consider historical topics and popular culture from a unique perspective.

Earning her MFA from Columbia College Chicago Center for Book and Paper, her work is featured in the collections of the University of Washington, the Newberry Library, Northwestern University, the Art Institute of Chicago, and Yale University.



DESCRIPTION

Technical Director of Pacific Northwest Ballet, Norbert Herriges, will help students understand the process of converting designer drawings into physical scenery. The class will focus on the sets of a show previously produced by the Ballet. We will discuss the details of the drawings, including how the sets might impact the performers. the materials that would be best for the sets construction, and how it ought to be constructed in transportable pieces that can be easily handled and assembled onstage. One of the tools used in this process is the scale model. It helps

designers and directors to understand how the set looks, and in what ways it will facilitate the needs of the performance. The class will conclude with the students constructing their own scale model versions of the set studied, using foam core board.

Norbert Herriges began working in Seattle theater after receiving a degree in Theatre Arts at Southern Oregon State College in Ashland. In the course of his 30+ year career in local theater, Mr. Herriges has worked backstage for PNB in various capacities. Most notably, he coordinated the set construction for the 2016 production of Georae Balanchine's Coppélia. Stepping into the role of Technical Director in 2011, Mr. Herriges oversees and coordinates all technical aspects of PNB's productions, assisted by an exceptional staff of stage technicians and managers.

Notes: Students should come equipped with pencils, a foam backed straight edge (ruler) and an exacto or matte knife.

The Sounder train and Metro Bus line 62 with an Orca Pass is an option for

transportation to Seattle.



We in the Pacific Northwest live in a geologically active part of the planet. We have a deep history of assembling our land by crashing and slipping major parts of Earth's crust. Our more recent history of landscape formation reflects both deep roots and surficial processes. We will discuss the historical geology of how the Pacific Northwest was assembled, and why geology is so active here.



We also will learn about how both societies and individuals can live safely in this dynamic area, where we regularly experience earthquakes, volcanoes, landslides, floods and quickly shifting shorelines.
