## EXPERIENCE

Most lessons are taught on the Gottfried and Mary Fuchs Organ, built by Paul Fritts and Co. It is regarded as one of the finest mechanical action organs in the country, sensitive to the touch, and located in beautiful hall with marvelous acoustics.

Ample practice times are available on this instrument, as well as on other instruments by Bosch, Schlicker, Kilgen, and White.

There are plenty of performance opportunities both as soloist as well as accompanist, and students can easily find a church position in the area if they so desire.

University Organist Paul Tegels maintains an active performance schedule, and has presented lectures and other presentations at chapters of the American Guild of Organists, Chico Bach Festival, and other venues. He has played at several national conventions of the Organ Historical Society, and is the past president of the Westfield Center for Keyboard Studies.
