THE CHOIR

The **Choir of the West** is the premier choral ensemble at Pacific Lutheran University, located in Tacoma, Washington. Founded in 1926, the choir was the third Lutheran college choir to tour extensively throughout the United States. Choir of the West has also toured Europe, Scandinavia, Japan, and China, and has performed at several state, division and national conferences of the National Association for Music Education and the American Choral Directors Association. Most recently, the choir was selected to perform at the 2022 Northwestern Region ACDA Conference (Spokane, WA). Choir of the West also gave a highly acclaimed performance at the 2013 ACDA National Conference held in Dallas, which included premieres of the works *Northern Lights*, by Latvian composer Ēriks Ešenvalds and *Exsultate*, by Brian Galante. The choir was invited to perform a featured concert at the 2015 National Collegiate Choral Organization Conference under the direction of headliner Simon Carrington. Choir of the West won two gold awards at the 2011 Harmonie Festival in Lindenholzhausen, Germany, and won two categories at the 2015 Anton Bruckner Competition in Linz, Austria. The choir was awarded the Anton Bruckner Prize as the most outstanding ensemble in the competition.

Choir of the West regularly participates in premieres of important new works, most recently, the chamber version of JAC Redford's *Homing*, the North American premiere of Ēriks Ešenvalds' *Nordic Light Symphony* (2017) and Sven-David Sandström's *Matthauspassion* (2016). In April of 2018 the choir spent a week with Ešenvalds in residence at PLU, collaborating to record a new compact disc of his unaccompanied works entitled *There Will Come Soft Rains*, which was released on the Signum Classics label in January of 2020. This album has received accolades in numerous reviews.

The Choir of the West is comprised of undergraduate students from a variety of academic disciplines. The choir performs several concerts each year, including shared programs with other PLU ensembles, the annual series of five Christmas Concerts (filmed for broadcast on PBS in 2015), and campus celebratory events. The choir tours domestically in three out of four years, and once every four years tours internationally.

THE CONDUCTOR

Brian Galante is Chair of the Department of Music and Director of Choral Studies at Pacific Lutheran. In Fall 2022, he became the seventh conductor of the PLU Choir of the West. Before taking on his administrative responsibilities in 2018, Galante also conducted Chorale (SATB), University Singers (SA) and Knights Chorus (TB), and taught undergraduate courses in Vocal Pedagogy for the Choral Music Educator, Choral Methods, and Choral Literature.

Galante received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting, with a related field in Voice Science and Pedagogy, from the University of North Texas. He holds Master of Music and Bachelor of Music degrees from Louisiana State University. Previous choral appointments include Visiting Associate Director of Choral Studies at Louisiana State University; Conductor of the University of North Texas Men's Chorus and Conducting Associate of the UNT A Cappella Choir; Director of Choral Music/Coordinator of K-12 Music at Highland Park High School, Dallas, Texas; Director of Choirs at Episcopal High School and Director of Music at St. Louis King of France Catholic Church, both in Baton Rouge.

Choirs under Galante's direction have offered invitational performances for the 2010 Washington Music Educators Association conference (PLU Chorale); the 2011 Northwest MENC Conference (PLU Knights Chorus); and the 2012 Northwest Region ACDA Conference (PLU Chorale). He has conducted honor choirs at all levels, and led workshops on conducting pedagogy, voice science, and repertoire.

In addition, Galante is an accomplished composer and arranger. His compositions are published by Galante Music, Walton Music, and Colla Voce Music, and have been performed by choirs of all levels throughout the United States and Europe. Galante's works have recorded for commercial release by Delos, Centaur Records, and MSR Classic. He is the recipient of multiple ASCAP Plus awards, and a regular composer-in-residence for the Taylor Festival Choir (Charleston, SC).

Galante has been an active member of ACDA since 1997. He served as President of Louisiana ACDA (2001-2003), on the National Technology Committee (2007-2011), Honor Choir Performance Site Chair (Oklahoma City, 2009), Northwestern Region Conference Program Chair (Seattle, 2010; Portland, 2018), Transportation Coordinator (Chicago, 2011), Associate Conference Chair (Dallas, 2013), and Northwestern Region President (2018-2020). He is also a member of the American Society for Composers, Authors, and Publishers (ASCAP), the National Collegiate Choral Organization (NCCO), and the Washington Music Educators Association.

THE PIANIST

Amy E. Boers is known in the greater Seattle-Tacoma area as a collaborative keyboardist, vocalist, conductor, and church musician. A lifelong resident of this area, she received her Master of Music in Choral Conducting from Central Washington University. Her keyboard playing for conductors and soloists has been characterized as deeply expressive, artistic, and insightfully supportive. As choral conductor, Boers has adjudicated large ensemble festivals across the region and has led workshops in Canada on "Collaborative work in the Choral rehearsal". With her husband Geoffrey, she is Co-Minister of Music at Grace Lutheran Church, Des Moines. As pianist, Boers is currently serving positions at PLU, Symphony Tacoma, and Symphony Tacoma Voices as well as many regional conventions and festivals. At PLU, she served as Musical Director for two productions in the 2022-2023 season. Boers continues to tour throughout Europe with choral ensembles, most recently to Spain and Portugal, where she will return to perform in 2023.
