Good evening, and welcome to our program!

We are thrilled to be touring beautiful Croatia, with stops along the Dalmatian coast and the Istrian peninsula. We appreciate you spending a part of your day with us, and we hope to visit with you after our concert.

Pacific Lutheran University is a liberal arts institution located in Tacoma, Washington (USA), about 30 miles south of Seattle, in the beautiful Pacific Northwest. **Choral Union** is a community chorus affiliated with PLU's renowned School of Music, Theater and Dance. The choir has a full membership of 60-70 singers, including alumni, students, and people from the surrounding community. Most of the members of the choir have collegiate singing experience. Choral Union has performed at prestigious choral music conferences, and in 2011 was awarded the "American Prize" for outstanding recorded performance by a community chorus.



The **Choral Union Tour Ensemble** travels every three years. Past tours have included visits to Austria, the Czech Republic, England, France, Germany, Italy, Norway, Slovenia, Sweden, and Switzerland. This is our second tour to Croatia. The choir has performed at the World Harp Congress (Geneva, Switzerland), the Cambridge (UK) Summer Music Festival, and Festival Bled (Slovenia). In 2014 the choir won the large mixed chorus and sacred music categories at the Florence International Choral Festival.



Conductor Richard Nance spent a 30-year career at Pacific Lutheran University (1992-2022), where he directed the Choir of the West, University Singers and Choral Union. Nance's choirs have performed at two National Conferences of the American Choral Directors Association, six ACDA Division Conferences, the 2011 Harmonie Festival in Lindenholzhausen, Germany (two gold awards and one silver), the 2014 Florence International Choral Festival (winner in two categories and for

outstanding conductor), the 2015 Anton Bruckner Choral Competition in Linz, Austria (winner in two categories and the Anton Bruckner award), and at the 2015 National Collegiate Choral Organization Conference. Nance received the 2011 and 2013 "American Prize" for Choral Conducting, and the 2013-2014 Faculty Excellence Award for Research at PLU. He has served in positions for the American Choral Directors Association and received awards for his leadership and service to the organization. Nance's choral works are published by Walton Music, Hinshaw Music and Colla Voce Music. He composed the prestigious Raymond W. Brock Commission (2002) for the American Choral Directors Association.

Tonight's program features contemporary sacred choral repertoire, highlighted by works composed specifically for this tour by members of the choir. We begin with the premiere of Cantate Domino, by PLU graduate and Choral Union member TJ Wheeler - an exciting, rhythmic setting of Psalm 96. Next we will sing a set of three traditional American hymns, arranged by renowned composers Alice Parker, Paul J. Christiansen and René Clausen. PLU graduate Austin Schend composed his beautiful, introspective work *Under Heaven* for this tour in 2020, prior to it being postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Next will follow another premiere, I Am The True Vine - a lovely, passionate work by Choral Union member Daniel Schreiner, and two motets by Basque composer Josu Elberdin - his lyrical Ubi Caritas and a dancelike Cantate Domino, which features English, Latin and Basque versions of Psalm 96. We will finish the program with Canadian composer Sarah Quartel's stirring arrangement of the American folk hymn How Can I Keep From Singing? and a beloved choral benediction, The Lord Bless You And Keep You by Peter C. Lutkin.
