How is PLU Different from High School?

Personal Freedom in High School

High School is mandatory and probably free Other people structure your time Parents and others guide moral decisions Others guide appropriate behavior You are a minor

High School Classes

You go from one class directly to another You spend 30 hours a weeks in class A class lasts for 5 to 10 months Your school day looks full Doing homework is the last part of your day Homework is highly structured Homework is collected and graded

High School Teachers

Carefully monitor attendance
Remind you of incomplete work
Approach you if you seem to need help
Often available to talk before and after class
Provide you with what you miss if absent
Follow a textbook
Write key info on board or give handouts
Teach to the intellectual middle of the class

Studying in High School

Study an hour or so before a test Readings are thoroughly discussed in class You know what to expect on a test

Tests in High School

Testing is frequent and covers one section Makeup tests are easily available The teacher reminds you to make up a test Review sessions are routine Tests ask you to give back facts

Grades in High School

Everything you do contributes to your grade Good homework grades can save you Extra credit can help raise a grade If grades improve, you get the better grade You graduate if you pass required courses

Personal Freedom at PLU

College is voluntary and very expensive You structure your time You make your own moral decisions You determine your own behavior You are an adult

PLU Classes

You may have hours between classes
You spend about 15 hours a week in class
A class lasts 14 weeks (or in January, a month)
Your day looks like you have lots of free time
Class preparation is an all-day activity
Study is both assigned and self-directed reading
Assigned work is usually not collected or corrected, but
discussed in class.

PLU Faculty

Regular class attendance is expected of all students
Absence from class for any reason does not excuse the
student from completing all course work
You know what you need to do
Wait for you to ask for help
Are available during office hours
Your responsibility to get what you missed
Might follow a book. Lectures are equally important
Expect you to figure out what is important
Teach at a more challenging level

Studying in College

Study 2 or 3 hours per day for each hr. of class Readings may not be discussed in class Professors say "Know everything" on the material assigned

Tests in College

Tests occur every 4-6 weeks and cover a lot Makeup tests are seldom an option You must take initiative for possible makeup Review sessions are rare Exams require analysis and synthesis as well as facts

Grades in College

Papers and exams determine grades
Homework carries little or no weight
Extra credit seldom exists
Your grades are an average of all exams/papers
You graduate if your GPA meets requirement
