Analysis of Gender Issues

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Extractive Industries Are Fueling Violence Against Indigenous Women

Indigenous Women experience hardship due to:

 Extractive industries solely communicating with men (which deprives women of their traditional role of status/power)

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Indigenous women having less economic benefit or

employment opportunities from extractive industries

Women experiencing an increase in violence, sexual assault,
 STI's, unplanned pregnancies, and prostitution.

Impacts on Indigenous Communities

 There is conclusive data demonstrating the impacts extractive industries have on Indigenous communities

Direct Impacts to Indigenous Women

 The conclusion can be drawn that the negative impacts experienced from extractive industries are disproportionately felt by Indigenous women.



Policy Suggestion

International public policy must intentionally protect Indigenous communities, and specifically Indigenous women.

- Stricter environmental policies
- International legal requirement that companies must receive clear consent from Indigenous representatives
- Expand studies on Indigenous communities and Indigenous women that are near mines or oil drilling sites
- Reparations for those Indigenous communities impacted, through fiscal, medical, legal, political, and social means
