In this history course you will explore the fascinating cities of London, Paris, Chartres, Stratford-upon-Avon, Windsor, and Cambridge. Our primary subjects will be the politics, culture, and religion of England during the Tudor monarchies (1485-1603). Program highlights include:

- Investigate the lives of Richard III, Henry VIII, Anne Boleyn, Thomas Cromwell, & Elizabeth I.
- Guided walking tours of London, Stratford-upon-Avon, Paris, Windsor Castle, the Louvre, the medieval colleges of Cambridge, and more.
- Explore famous castles, museums, churches, art collections, and historic towns and markets.

Course Description:

History 332 is a travel course that investigates political, cultural, and religious developments in early modern England during the years of the Tudor monarchies (1485-1603). Central themes include the cultural and economic development of England in the 16th century; Tudor art and architecture as explored through important museums, castles, cathedrals, and urban landscapes; diplomatic relations with France, Spain, and Scotland; and Elizabethan drama. Students in the course will read interesting books about Tudor England and visit world-renowned museums and research facilities that offer unparalleled access to primary materials, including the British Library and the University of Cambridge. Daily meetings and walking tours are designed to build community and promote a team-approach to learning about (and participating in!) English and French cultures. Course requirements include daily meetings and walking tours, weekly journal assignments, group readings, presentations in class, and a research paper due at the end of the term.

Application Deadline:

September 30, 2013. A non-refundable deposit of \$50.00 is required with the application. A \$250 non-refundable payment to confirm participation in the course is due within 10 days of notification of acceptance. Maximum 18 students.
