Birthplace of the modern world, Manchester was the world's first industrial city, and it has left a deep imprint on politics, economics, literature, and art. Through walking tours and visits to historical sites, and through readings by Shelley, Gaskell, Engels, and Orwell, we will trace the progress of industrialization and political reform and evaluate literature's power as a political tool. Highlights will include visits to the People's History Museum, Museum of Science & Industry, the Town Hall, the Art Gallery, Old Trafford, and the Imperial War Museum, plus the Slavery Museum and Maritime History Museum in nearby Liverpool.
