Course Description:

The most important time period in the literature of the organ is the 17th and 18th century. Designed and geared for organists, this J-term study course and tour will allow organists to study and play repertoire of this period on instruments of this period. It will allow students to see how the organ reacts to their playing, how to adjust their playing to the instrument and allow students to get a sound image of the 17th and 18th centuries. This unique opportunity will afford organists skills they can reproduce when playing a modern instrument.
