Course Description:

Students in this course will learn about the history and modern-day practice of religions important in China, Korea, and Japan by visiting more than a dozen authentic East Asian religious sties in and around Honolulu. This course is reading intensive, so students should be prepared to spend a good portion of the time we are not in class or on site visits reading primary texts for class. Students will also complete a group project on one of Honolulu's Asian religious sites. Please note, much of our travel within Honolulu will take place by public bus, and there will be a lot of walking.

April 12th, 2013. The instructor will interview all applicants. A nonrefundable deposit of \$50.00 is required with the application. A \$250 non-refundable payment to confirm participation in the course is due within 10 days of notification of acceptance. Maximum 18 students.
