Course Description:

What is the meaning of life, particularly in our postindustrial and technology driven era? In this course, we will examine how a specific group of philosophers called existentialists address questions of meaning. Existentialism is a wide-ranging philosophical movement which gained prominence, particularly in France after WWII, but its development can be traced through the work of European post-Enlightenment thinkers and even to Socrates in ancient Greece. Students in this course will explore this philosophical movement by focusing on the themes of authenticity, alienation, and conformity through the careful consideration of work by Kierkegaard, Camus, and Kafka.
