Course Description:

On campus we examine the archaeology and history of Makah Culture; then we spend two weeks on the Makah Reservation. Mornings are spent in a variety of volunteer placements in the community ranging from Head Start to the Senior Center. Afternoons and evenings focus on traditional and contemporary culture. Each year is a little different but past classes have included traditional stories by a Makah story teller, a Makah language class, basket weaving and carving, local foods, hikes in the rain forest and on the beach, tribal government, and the relationship between environmental protection legislation and Makah Culture.
