



We arrive in Tobago, and after a couple of days of orientation, head to Scarborough, where we spend most of our time.

In small groups, students shadow and volunteer in community-based settings, including health clinic, hospital, schools, and social service settings. In addition, we hear from local speakers and participate in a variety of excursions, exploring the natural and social environment of this beautiful island.

In this course we discuss privilege and power in the context of race, gender, and nationality. Through our observations, readings, reflections, and debriefing, we explore the meaning of service in another culture, as well as formulating a better understanding of our own ethic of meaningful service.
